 4. The Civil Construction of Four Staff Quarters for teaching staff and 4 staff quarters for non-teaching staff is in progress.
 5. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

5. **Establishment of Konaseema Instt. of Medical Sciences, Amalapuram by Mother Theresa Educational Society, Amlapuram**

Read: The compliance verification inspection report (15th & 16th June, 2004) for establishment of Konaseema Instt. of Medical Sciences, Amalapuram by Mother Theresa Educational Society, Amlapuram.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification report (15th and 16th June, 2004) and noted the following:-

1. (a) The shortage of teaching Faculty is 12.12 %
 - i) Professor : 1 (Physiology)
 - ii) Associate Professor : 2 (Anatomy-1, Physiology-1)
 - iii) Assistant Professor : 1 (Physiology)
 - vi) Tutor : 4 (Physiology-2, Pathology-1, Community Medicine-1)
 (b) The Shortage of Residents is 10.5% as under :
 - i) Jr. Resident : 4 (General Medicine)
 (c) The ratio of Medical to Non-Medical is 63% in the Department of Biochemistry which is not as per Council norms.
2. The Clinical Material does not match with the numbers provided by the authority. The numbers provided are exceeding almost by 50%. The OPD attendance was around 350-400. The Bed occupancy was around 60% in most of the wards. The laboratory investigations done were around 50-60 and X-rays 20-25. The registers were checked. They are written with the same pen and the same handwriting. The clinical material is still inadequate.
3. Mess is not available in the Girls Hostel. The compound wall for girls' hostel and nurses' hostel is incomplete.
4. There are no quarters for Paramedical Staff
5. In the hospital, at some of the places internal fittings and furnishing etc. are still being done. Some equipment is recently procured and some are being used. The treadmill machine is not yet commissioned. Therefore, the Hospital is not yet fully functional.
6. There is no playground available. All the roads are kutcha. The number of street lights is less than required.
7. CSSD is not functional. One vertical and one Horizontal sterilizer is available.

8. Central Laundry is manually operated.
9. Incinerator is installed but not functional.
10. Some of the equipment are recently installed and not commissioned. Some are yet to be installed. (eg: TMT Machine)
11. There is only one central kitchen in canteen, which provides food to all hostels.
12. The lift in the hospital as well as in the college is not installed.
13. Central photography section is not established.
14. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

In view of above, the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to reiterate its earlier decision to recommend to the Central Government to disapprove the scheme for establishment of Konaseema Instt. of Medical Sciences, Amalapuram by Mother Theressa Educational Society, Amlapuram.

6. Govt. Medical College, Latur – Renewal of permission for admission of 2nd batch of students for the academic session 2004-05.

Read: The Council Inspector report (15th & 16th June 2004) for renewal of permission for admission of 2nd batch of MBBS students for the academic session 2004-2005 at Govt. Medical College, Latur.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Inspectors report (15th and 16th June, 2004) and noted the following:-

1. (a) 69 faculty and resident have joined during the last three months. Out of 69, 21 have joined on the day of inspection, out of whom 8 faculty members have not submitted their relieving orders.
(b) In Microbiology, ratio of non-medical staff is 40% which is not as per norms.

*There is a rental building having 36 rooms with a capacity for 72 boys. Boys hostel is outside the campus. The construction of ground floor with 28 rooms for 56 students is under construction. Fittings and fixtures are yet to be done.

4. In OPD the sound proofing of audiometry room needs to be improved and the exhaust fan should be removed. There is no audiometry technician or speech therapist. In wards, there are no seminar halls in the major departments.
5. University affiliation for 2004-05 is not available.

6. (i) R.H.T.C is under the control of the State Government. Other departments are not participating in outreach programmes. There is no health educator. Lecture hall with A.V. aids needs to be provided.
- (ii) U.H.C is under financial and administrative control of Municipal Committee.
7. Statistical Unit is not available. Statistical work is carried out through Medical Record Department.
8. Common Room for boys is not available.
9. No medlar facility is available in the Central Library.
10. Registration and Medical Record Section :Indoor registration counter is not computerized and cross linked with outdoor registration numbers. The staff is not adequate. There is a need for appointment of adequately trained medical record technician.
11. A total number of 16 beds (6 emergency and 10 trauma - 4 female and 6 male) are available in casualty area. No central oxygen supply and no central suction is available in the casualty.
12. There is no central oxygen, no nitrous oxide supply and no central suction is available in Operation Theatre Unit. Resuscitation equipment is inadequate. TV with camera attachment is not available. There are no beds in the common post operative ward.
13. There are no beds available for ICCU or in Surgical, Burns, Paediatrics, Obstetrics ICU.
14. Ultrasound facility is not given to Obstetrics & Gynecology department.
15. Central sterilization department works from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. only. There is no bowl sterilizer, no Glove inspection machine and no instrument washing machine is available in CSSD. No racks are available. Only 16 trays and no mixers are available.
16. No mechanized laundry is available.
17. Vegetarian food is supplied free of charge to only about 40 patients daily. There is no provision to supply special diet as recommended by Physician. Services of dietician are not available.
18. Incinerator is not available.
19. Nursing staff is grossly inadequate as under:

20. There are no cadavers available in the Anatomy Department. No small dissection tables are available.
21. No Pharmaceutical chemist is available in the Pharmacology Department.
22. No catalogues are available in the museum of Forensic Medicine Department.
23. There is no practical laboratory is available in the department of Community Medicine. The departmental library cum seminar room has 12 seats and 38 books. There is no research laboratory is available.
24. In the departmental libraries, only 20 books are available for Medicine and allied specialties, 20 books in Surgery and in Obst. & Gynae. are available.
25. There is no lecture theatre in the hospital.
26. Other deficiencies/remarks are in the report.

In view of above, the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch of students during 2004-2005 at Govt. Medical College, Latur.

7. **Govt. Medical College, Kolhapur – Renewal of permission for admission of 4th batch of students for the academic session 2004-05.**

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Inspectors report (18th & 19th June, 2004) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to renew the permission for admission of 4th batch of 100 MBBS students at Govt. 2. Clinical material is inadequate in term of x-ray & laboratory investigations as under and it is not commensurate with the number at patients claimed to have been attended OPD & Indoor.

3. Common Rooms for Boys and Girls are not furnished and not being used.
4. Statistical Unit – A Statistician cum lecturer is posted from the University to oversee the work of this unit. He is not on the pay rolls of the college.
5. P.H.C. is currently under the control of the State Govt. and the college is allowed to use its facilities for teaching purposes. Other clinical departments like medicine, Paediatrics, Obst. & Gynae. do not participate in the outreach teaching programmes, as there is no vehicle in the department. The programme of visits was made but could not be executed. No lecturer cum medical officer having M.D. (PSM) is not available. LMO is not available. There is no hostel facility. There are no messing facilities. Staff as prescribed under norms needs to be appointed. There is no Lecturer cum Medical Officer, no Lady Medical Officer, there is no vehicle and driver attached to the PSM department/RHTC.
6. UHC – It is under financial and administrative control of State Govt. No lecturer cum medical office having M.D. (PSM) is posted. Delivery services are not available. The deficiency of equipment for sterilization operations still exists. There is deficiency of furniture. There is no Lecturer cum Medical Officer at UHTC.

Accommodation is available for 192 students only against the requirement of 350 and for 54 residents only against the requirement of 100.

8. Residential Quarters:- No quarters are available within the campus for teaching staff. No quarters are available for non-teaching staff.
9. There is no allocation of beds or doctors according to the units. There are no display boards either in the OPD or in the wards indicating the unit no or the doctor in charge. None of the case sheets in the various wards carried either the unit name or the name of the doctor in charge. The units in all the departments are not specified.
10. Central Casualty Service – Total 14 beds are available in casualty area, which is inadequate. Central oxygen supply and central suction are not available.
11. Surgical ICU is not available.
12. No ultrasound is given to Obstetrics & Gynaecology department.
13. In OTs, CCTV is not available.
14. Nursing staff is grossly inadequate as under:-

15. In Physiology Deptt., there is amphibian experimental physiology laboratory but it is not functional. There is no museum, no research lab and no mammalian experimental laboratory.
16. In Pharmacology Deptt., the research laboratory needs to be commissioned. There is no pharmaceutical chemist.
17. In Pathology Dept., considering the number of specimens, the museum is overcrowded and need to be expanded.
18. In Community Medicine, research laboratory is non-functional.
19. The numbers at books in the departmental Libraries are inadequate as under:-

Skin & V.D. – 57, Psychiatry 20, Paediatric –79, Orthopaedics –40, Oto-Rhino-Laryngology – 40, Ophthalmology – 68, Radio-Diagnosis – 69 and Anaesthesia –48.
20. In the department of Anatomy, 2 demonstration rooms have capacity of 40 only. There are no small dissection tables. There is shortage of non-teaching staff.
21. There is no glove inspection machine in CSSD
22. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

- (g) In view of above, the shortage of teaching faculty is more than 5% and shortage of Residents is more than 20%.

2. Affiliation for 2004-05 is not available.
3. Examination Hall is inadequate. It has capacity 168 seats.
5. R.H.T.C. is under the control of the MNR Medical college & Hospital, Sangareddy on lease basis for 10 years. No audiovisual aids or x-ray machine are available. No residential accommodation for the students and interns is available.
6. U.H.C. Centre is on lease for 5 years.
7. In TB & Chest & Skin & V.D. & Psychiatry, O.G. OPD, there is no teaching area available. In Skin & VD OPD, no facility for Biopsy/Lab investigations is available. Clinical psychologist is not available.
8. In Surgery OPD,
 - i) Minor O.T. in surgical OPD is not available.
 - ii) There is no view box in surgical demonstration cum teaching room.
6. In Obst. & Gynae. OPD, no demonstration cum teaching area is available.
7. In Medicine Ward, there is no view box in the demonstration cum teaching room.
8. In Surgical, Burns & Obstetrics ICU, only beds are provided. No equipment is available.
9. Anatomy departmental library is having 68 books, which is inadequate.
10. In Physiology Deptt., Amphibian laboratory has only 40 seats & Mammalian laboratory has only 15 seats which is inadequate as per norms.
11. In Forensic Deptt. – The postmortems are not done.
12. Books in the departmental library are inadequate as under:
Paediatrics-76, Radiology-74, ENT-72, O.G.-71.
13. There is no lecture theatre in the hospital. Third lecture theatre in the college is not as per norms.

2. OPD needs more space. In some of the OPDs departmental libraries are found.
3. Auditorium – The auditorium is located at the distance of 1 ½ km away in the building of the Information Technology College, which is owned by the trust. It has 600 seats.
4. Veterinary Officer on part time. Facilities for surgical procedures are not available.
5. Central Library – Total number of journals subscribed are 80, of which 55 are Indian and 25 are Foreign which is less than 70 and 30 required respectively as per norms.
6. Health Centre – Bhayander PHC is owned and run by the Maharashtra Govt. Health Deptt. College has attachment for training purpose. The R.H.C. at Nareshwadi – It is owned by the college. It is 120 kms away from the Medical College. At present there is no much involvement of the department.
7. U.H.C. – The outpatient attendance is nil. Delivery services are not available.
8. Hostel – There is no hostel facilities available in the college campus for the undergraduate. Total accommodation available for UG students is 69 out side the campus as against the requirement of 400.
9. Intern hostel is not available.
10. Nurses Hostel – There is no separate hostel for nursing staff working in the hospital.
11. Residential quarters for the faculty - only 3 flats are available in Harshad Apartments located ½ km away from the college. No other accommodation is available. No accommodation for class-III & IV employees.
12. Medicine Unit I is having 2 senior teachers as against the requirement of 3.
13. In OPD - By and large all OPDs are located in one central room where two or three consultants can sit and take history of the patients. There is no privacy to the patient while taking history. Teaching area are very small in size. In some of the OPDs, departmental libraries are found.
14. Ward for female patients is a big hall which is divided by incomplete partitions to make General Medicine ward, TB ward and Skin VD Ward. Patients and patients relative can freely move from the one place to another in these wards. There is no Psychiatry ward for female patient. Toilet facilities are also common. More or less, same arrangements are seen for male patients.

- In teaching hospital, the distance between the two beds in wards having beds more than 20, is less and looks congested.
- There is a hostel for girls to accommodate 86 students (one room for four students with sharing toilet). However, the ground floor of the girls hostel block houses four facilities viz.: workshop, manifold room, hospital kitchen and a cafeteria. The construction, completion work is in progress for a boy's hostel with the capacity to accommodate 60 students (12 rooms x 2 ground floor, 12 roomsx3 first floors with common toilet), kitchen and dining room.
- The accommodation for nurses is provided in two separate residential areas, which is located 5 kms. from the hospital.
- Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the Council Inspectors report 15th & 16th June, 2004 and noted the following:-

1. The shortage of teaching staff is more than 5% is as under:
 - (a)
 - (i) Professor-2 (General Surgery-1, Radio-Diagnosis-1)
 - (ii) Assoc.Prof.-1 (Pathology)
 - (iii) Asstt.Prof.-10 (Anatomy-2, Biophysics-2, Pharmacology-1, Pathology-1, TB & Chest-2, Anaesthesia-1, Radiology-1)
 - (iv) Tutors-9 (Anatomy-2, Biochemistry-1, Pharmacology-2, Pathology-2, Microbiology-2)
 - (b) The shortage of residents is 10.4% as under:
Jr. Residents-6 (General Medicine-1, TB & Chest-1, Skin & VD-3, Obst. & Gynae-1)
 - (c) The Dean of the institution has provided a letter from Director of Health Services, Govt. of Maharashtra stating that the Medical Officers working in Medical College Hospitals shall be designated as Tutors and in accordance to this order the Dean has re-designated about 35 such Medical Offices as Tutors in various clinical and non-clinical departments.
 - (d) A total of 38 teaching staff has been transferred/joined this institution in the past three months. They are 10 Professors, 3 Associate Professors, & 25 Lecturers. Two pre-clinical lecturers have submitted their resignation but not yet relived.
2. Clinical material is inadequate in terms of x-ray and laboratory investigations and not commensurate with the intake of patients claimed.
3. Statistical work is carried out through Medical Record Department.
4. The following building blocks are proposed and under construction:
 - (i) Girls Residences
 - (ii) New Girls Hostel
 - (iii) New Boys Hostel
 - (iv) Residence-Class I & II Quarters
5. One lecture theatre has capacity of 100 which is inadequate.
6. In Animal House, the staff consists of 1 M.V.Sc. Graduate on part time basis. There are no frogs and no other animals except rabbits are present. No animal experiments are being conducted at present.
7. Photography & Artist Section: Dark room facility is yet to be commissioned. There is no Photographer or Artist.
8. The institution presently does not have a Rural Health Training Center adopted or owned by itself for teaching and training of UG and internees. The college is yet to take over the UHTC.
9. The central workshop is available in the adjacent Government Maternity Hospital for maintenance and repair.
10. Hostel facilities are inadequate as under:-
 - a) There is no hostel for boys & nurses within the campus.
 - b) Accommodation for residents is inadequate.

11. There is no computerization of registration counters in the OPD. The audiometry (with sound proof and A/C) room is available but not yet commissioned.
12. Wards: Medicine ward also had allied subject patients and surgery wards also had beds of ENT, Dental etc. hence there was crowding in some of the wards. This required to be rearranged. Toilets were in need of proper maintenance. There were no ward side seminar rooms in the major departments.
13. Medical Record Section: there is no internet connection, no retrieval of patient data was available and there is no separate secure filing system for MLC records.
14. No central oxygen or suction facility is provided in central casualty.
15. The gas cylinders have to be kept in a separate open place outside the labs.
16. The normal deliveries are only 15-20 per month in the hospital.
17. There is no separate facility for incoming and outgoing segregation of the used and autoclaved material.
18. There is no mechanized laundry.
19. The surroundings of the kitchen need proper cleanliness.
20. There is a non functioning incinerator at the backyard of the campus near mortuary.
21. The gas cylinders are kept outside the practical laboratory in a separate enclosure in Biochemistry department.
22. Departmental library cum seminar room has only 52 books in Pharmacology deptt.
23. In Microbiology deptt., the departmental library has 35 books and the museum is not fully equipped having only 70 charts, 15 culture media and 7 parasites with a few instruments in Microbiology deptt.
24. Demonstration room not provided with black board and audio visual aids in Forensic Medicine deptt. There is a space for laboratory which is yet to be furnished. Cold storage for 4 bodies in 2 units is about to be commissioned in mortuary.
25. At present there are no practical laboratories or seminar cum library and demonstration room in the department of Community Medicine.
26. Books in the departmental libraries are inadequate as under:-
Medicine-34, TB & Chest, Skin & VD, Psychiatry and Paediatric-29, General Surgery-32, Orthopaedics-30, Oto-Rhino-Laryngology, Ophthalmology-24, Radio-Diagnosis-18 and Anaesthesia-16.
27. The teaching departments of Anatomy, Physiology and Biochemistry established, equipped and functional. Departments of Community Medicine, Forensic Medicine, Pathology, Microbiology and Pharmacology have a full complement of infrastructure and space and are in various stages of furnishing and provision of equipments. The Dean of the institution has given an undertaking to complete and make these departments completely functional by 10th August, 2004 or before the arrival IInd MBBS students or whichever is earlier.
28. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

In view of above the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch of MBBS students at Govt. Medical College, Akola for the academic session 2004-05.

Dr. R. Baskaran, Dermatology Professor was not present during inspection. The Dean has informed the Director of Medical Education vide letter dt. 3.6.2004 that the said Doctor is absent from duty.

Dr. N. Murali, Radio-Diagnosis, Assistant Professor was not present during inspection. He is stated to have resigned from service ON 29.5.2004.

Dr. T.L. Anbumani, Anatomy Assistant Professor was not present during inspection.

Dr. P. Sivaprakasam, Com. Med Professor was not present during inspection. He is stated to have resigned and was relieved on 1.6.2004.

Dr. A. Rasheeda, Physiology, Assistant Professor was not present during inspection.

Dr. P. Arunalatha, Pathology, Assistant Professor was present during the inspection.

Dr. Kokila Selvaraj, Com. Medi, Assistant Professor was not present during inspection

- (d) Since the last inspection i.e., after 3.4.2004; 26 Faculty and Tutors joined the institution. Six joined on 3.5.2004, nineteen joined on 31.5.2004 and one joined on 14.6.2004. Since last inspection forty four Junior Residents joined on 5.5.2004. 12 staff members reported at 2.00 p.m. on 26 June, 2004. Their declaration forms are not complete in all respects. All of them have been shown to have joined on 31.5.2004. Department wise attendance records for verification were asked for but were not provided.

2. No Residential quarters are available in the college campus.
3. No Lecturer cum Medical Officer having MD (PSM) degree is available at the RHTC.
4. No hostel is available for interns and residents.
5. One computer has been installed in the OPD registration but, actual computerization of OPD registration has not started. Actual computerization of in-patient registration has not started and it is not cross linked to the out door registration.
6. Central Oxygen and central suction are not available in the casualty.
7. All wards, OTs, OPD, Office and Departments are not connected with EPABX lines.
8. In the Department of Anatomy, band saw is still not available.
9. In the department of PSM some more models and charts have been added but still the number of specimens and models are inadequate.
10. Books in the departmental libraries are inadequate.
11. Hostel accommodation is available for 216 students against the requirement of 500.
12. Other deficiencies/remarks in the main report.

In view of above the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students at Toothukudi Medical College, Toothukudi for the academic session 2004-05.

27. MKCG Medical College, Berhampur – Increase of seats in 1st MBBS course from 107 to 150.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (24th & 25th June, 2004) alongwith the inspection report February, 2004 and noted the following deficiencies still persisting:-

1. The shortage of teaching staff is as under:-

 - ii) Associate Professor - 12 (Anatomy – 2, Physiology – 1, Biochemistry –1, Microbiology –1, Paediatrics – 1, Surgery – 2, Ophthalmology – 1, Anaesthesia – 1 & Radio diagnosis – 1)
 - iii) Assistant Professor – 7 (Anatomy –3, Paediatrics –1, Obst. & Gynae. – 1, ANMO – 1, MWO –1)
 - iv) Tutor - 17
 - v) Lecturer in Biophysics - 2
& Pharmaceutical Chemist
2. The Principal is not qualified as he has experience of Professor for only 3 years.
3. OPD Attendance on the day of inspection was 722 while Indoor occupancy is only 62%, which is inadequate.
4. In ICCU – There are no central monitoring and ventilator facility available.
5. Post operative room has got 4 beds without any equipments.
6. NICU – No ventilator available. there are no Paediatric, Obstetric and Burn ICU.
7. Pharmacy – There is no proper displaying of pharmacy in the OPD and Casualty.
8. CSSD – Status of receiving and distribution stations is not as per norms.
9. Incinerator is not installed till the day of inspection.
10. Nursing Staff is grossly inadequate as under:-
Matron –1, Asstt. Matron –1, Nursing Sister – 19, Staff Nurse – 135.
11. The Deptt. of Pathology practical class is also shared by Microbiology Deptt. for their practical and demonstration purposes which needs to be separated with separate facilities. In the museum, there is no increase in representative system specimens since last inspection.
12. Microbiology Museum – It has no catalogues, 12 laminated charts displayed on the walls and 15 specimens. The Microbiology Deptt. is not performing any HIV test since 24/3/2004.
13. Blood Bank is not under the administrative control of the Principal/ Superintendent. It is run by Orissa Red Cross Society. The registration was valid upto 31-12-99. So far no further extension for registration has been received. The Ophthalmology wards were visited by the inspection team on 24/6/04 at 9-15 p.m., no Resident or any staff member was available in the wards inspite of instructions through the Principal and Superintendent not to leave the Hospital till their wards are inspected. The patients were operated in Ophthalmology were lying in the ward without any mattress or bed sheets. Casualty beds were also without any bed sheets at the time of visit of the inspection team at 9.15 P.M.
14. Other deficiencies/remarks in the main report.

3. The college does not having financial and administrative control of the RHTC and UHC. The administrative control not with the college. It was found the teaching room and facilities are inadequate. There is no furniture. The doctor's living room does not have a fan. There is no mess facility. Overall infrastructure and facilities inadequate.
4. The nursing staff is inadequate for the number of teaching beds in the hospital.

There are only 10-12 deliveries and 4-5 cesarean section per month. The clinical work load in the department of Obst. & Gynae is very low.

There is a gross disparity between the deliveries recorded in the labour room register and the actual deliveries conducted as verified by the MRD birth register.

Average bed occupancy observed on the days of inspection across all disciplines remained about 30%.

3. In R. H. T.C., clinical departments like Medicine, Paediatrics and Obst. & Gynae. do not participate in the outreach teaching programmes. L. M. O. is not available. Students and interns have not been posted in batches as yet. Messing facilities are not available. Lecture hall cum seminar room is not available. No audio-visual aids have been provided. There was no indoor patient at the time of inspection. No deliveries are conducted in the centre. Staff as prescribed under norms needs to be appointed.
4. In U. H. C., delivery services are not available. There are no signboards/ display boards.
5. In undergraduate students hostel, no student was seen during the inspection.
6. Distribution of beds is deficient as under :-
 - (a) There is a deficiency of 28 beds in General Medicine. Total 92 beds are available as against 120 required as per norms.
 - (b) There is a deficiency of 15 beds in Paediatrics. Total 45 beds are available as against 60 required as per norms.
 - (c) There is a deficiency of 5 beds in Obstetrics and Gynaecology Department. No segregation between ANC and Gynaecology beds is done.
7. There is no demarcation of units in any specialty. The units are not displayed either in the OPD or in the wards. There is no name of doctor incharge or the unit No. on the case sheets in all specialties.
8. Record keeping is poor and exaggerated.
9. There is no demarcated resuscitation area in emergency for a critically injured /ill patients.
10. There are no segregated areas for clean and septic cases in Obstetrics and Nursery.
11. There is acute shortage of nursing staff in all the Wards & OTs. The ward ayas and nursing orderlies are substituting for staff nurses both in the wards and the OTs.
12. There is no separate registration counter for male and female patients.
13. There is no separate injection room for male and female patients.
14. Some floors of the hospital are under construction and civil work is in progress.
15. Indoor registration counter is not computerised and not cross linked with outdoor registration numbers. Medical Record Section is not computerised. ICD classification of diseases is available but not followed for indexing. Trained personnel are not present.
16. There are 4 main operation theatres and one emergency TO against 10 required as per norms. Resuscitation equipment is inadequate. There are no printed OT note proformas.
17. There is combined ICU of 6 beds. No separate surgical, Paediatric and Obst. & Gynae. ICUs are available. There were no patients in ICU or CCU on the days of inspection.
18. In Central Sterilization department, bowl sterilizer, Glove inspection machine and instrument washing machine in CSSD are not available.
19. Kitchen is under construction.
20. There is acute deficiency of nursing staff. The details of staff are as under :-

21. In Anatomy Department, museum is not divided in parts.

22. In the Department of Biochemistry, the gas cylinders need to be kept away in a separate enclosure.
23. In Pathology Department, the museum is overcrowded and need to be expanded.
24. Research laboratory in Community Department is non-functional.
25. Books in the departmental libraries are inadequate as under:-
Medicine - 70, TB & Chest - 10, Skin & VD - 6, Psychiatry - 10, Paediatrics - 15, Oto-Rhino-Laryngology - 70, Ophthalmology-78 and Anaesthesia - 50.
26. In Physiology, the research laboratory is not functional.
27. In Pharmacology, Museum needs to be upgraded and research laboratory is non-functional. No research papers published during the last 3 years.
28. In Radio-diagnosis, 500 mA x 800 mA x-ray machines and I.I.T.V. System and fluoroscopy system and 3 mobile units of 60 mA as required under norms are not available.
29. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

In view of above the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students at Subharti Medical College, Meerut for the academic session 2004-05.

34. Medicity Instt. of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur– Renewal of permission for admission of 2nd batch of students for the academic session 2004-05.

Read: The compliance verification inspection report (28th & 29th June 2004) for renewal of permission of admission of 2nd batch of MBBS students for the academic session 2004-2005 at Medicity Instt. of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (28th & 29th June , 2004) alongwith the previous inspection reports (4th & 5th May & 11th & 12th June, 2004) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch of 100 MBBS students for the academic session 2004-05 at Medicity Instt. of Medical Sciences, Ghanpur.

35. North Bengal Medical College, Darjeeling – Renewal of permission for admisison of 4th batch of students against the increased intake i.e. from 50 to 100 for the academic session 2004-05.

Read: The compliance verification Inspection report (29th & 30th June, 2004) for renewal of permission for admission of 4th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. 50 to 100 at North Bengal Medical College, Darjeeling.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (29th & 30th June, 2004) alongwith the inspection report May, 2004 and noted the following deficiencies still persisting:-

1. The total number of laboratory investigations are still low and not commensurate with the inpatient and outpatient load.
2. Currently there is accommodation for only 125 in examination hall.
3. The total number of foreign journals now subscribed are 21 and 19 Indian. and Medlar facility is still not available.
4. The colour coding system for biochemical waste disposal in hospital is still not strictly followed. Deficiency persists.
5. Presently, the hostel for interns and residents is combined. There is no plan for a separate interns and resident hostel. One boys hostel with 70 rooms is under construction. It is still not ready. One girls hostel for 60 students is not currently furnished.
6. Speech therapist has not been posted. Deficiency remains as it is.
7. Seats are not available in the teaching areas in wards. Ward side laboratories are still located near by the Nursing Station with out enclosure.
8. The registration is still done manually as the staff is not yet trained and software is not installed. Indoor registration counter is not yet computerized. The entire

work in the MRD Dept., is done manually pending training of personnel and software installation.

9. There are no crash cots available in the Casualty.
10. The repair work for Observation gallery - is not complete in O.T. TV with cameras attachment is not available.
11. There is no separate Medical ICU
12. There is no 800mA machine 500 mA machine is out of use. Thus deficiency remains as it is.
13. Deficiency of Mechanized Laundry remains as it is.
14. Deficiency of Incinerator remains as it is.
15. There are 20 books in TB & Chest department, 29 books in Psychiatry department, 74 books in ENT department, 62 books in Radio-diagnosis department, which is inadequate.
16. No lecture theatre is available in the hospital.
17. There is a Dental College with annual intake of 20 stated to be running for the last 12 years on the ground and first floor of para-clinical departments in the medical college building.
18. There is no Central suction in the hospital.
19. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

In view of above the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of 4th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. 50 to 100 at North Bengal Medical College, Darjeeling for the academic session 2004-05.

36. Bharati Vidyapeeth Medical College, Pune – Increase of seats in 1st MBBS course form 120 to 150.

Read: The compliance verification inspection report(28th June, 2004) for increase of Seats in Ist MBBS course from 120 to 150 at Bharati Vidyapeeth Medical College, Pune.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (28th & 29th June, 2004) alongwith the previous inspection report (31st March & 1st April, 2004) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to issue letter of permission for increase of seats in 1st MBSB course i.e. 120 to 150 at Bharati Vidyapeeth Deemed University Medical College, Pune for the academic session 2004-05 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

37. Pt. Bhagwat Dayal PGIMS, Rohtak - renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of studnets against the increased intake seats i.e. from 115 to 150 for the academic session 2004-05.

Read: The compliance verification Inspection report (29th & 30th June, 2004) for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. 115 to 150 at Pt. Bhagwat Dayal PGIMS Rohtak.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (29th & 30th June, 2004) alongwith the inspection report May, 2004 and noted the following deficiencies are still persisting:-

1. (a) The shortage of teaching faculty is 20%(i.e. 44 out of 226)

Tutor - 8 (Pathology -2, Pharmacology -3, Community Medicine -1, Anaesthesiology -2) :

(b) The shortage of Residents is 30% (i.e. 26 out of 81) as under :-

- ii) Jr. Residents - 22 (Medicine - 9, Psychiatry -1, Surgery-12)

2. The number of students admitted in Diploma in TB & Chest, Diploma in Orthopaedics,. Diploma in OBG, Diploma in Child Health, Diploma in Ophthalmic Medicine and Surgery and Diploma in Venereal Diseases is higher than permitted under PG Regulation as per the number of the units are available in the Depts. Additional Diplomas are as under :-

- 3. The post of Statistician is lying vacant.
- 4. An auditorium with 400 seats is available. New auditorium with the capacity of 750 seats is going to be constructed in future.
- 5. The Veterinary officer is coming from the Haryana State Services once a week.
- 6. At UHC, delivery services are not available.
- 7. There are seven counters managed manually.
- 8. Blood Bank is not in the control of Pathology Department.
- 9. There is a deficiency of 10 beds in the department of Ophthalmology.
- 10. A cooling cabinet with 4 chambers to accommodate 4 bodies is available and it is yet to be installed.
- 11. The following deficiencies pointed out in the inspection report of 7th & 8th May 2004 have been rectified partially to the extent indicated hereunder :-

13. Dr. O. P. Lathwal has been posted as Medical Superintendent and PGIMS, Rohtak by appointment on transfer from Haryana Civil Medical Services (HCMS) Cadre in the grade of Civil Surgeon.
14. Dr. S. S. Sangwan, Dean of the institution is holding the charge of Head of Department of Orthopaedics. His joining report as the Dean is not shown to the inspection team.
15. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

In view of above the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students against the increased intake i.e. 115 to 150 at Pt. B.D.Sharma PGIMS, Rohtak for the academic session 2004-05.

38. Establishment of Medical College at Dehradun by Shri Guru Ram Rai Education Mission, Dehradun.

Read: The application for establishment of medical College, Dehradun alongwith compliance submitted by the applicant authority through the Central Government.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the documents now submitted on behalf of the Trust. It was observed that as per the statutory qualifying criteria, each applicant u/s 10A of the Act seeking permission of the Central Government for starting a new medical college is required to be the owner of 25 acres of unitary/single piece of land. If this condition is not fulfilled, it is deficient in fulfilling one of the pre conditions of the qualifying criteria.

The Committee further noted that the establishment of the new medical college alongwith its hospital has to be in the same campus of 25 acres of land. In the present case, in the inspection conducted by the MCI, it was observed that the land holding of this the applicant is divided by a running road. 9 acres of land is one the one side and 26 acres of land is on the other side of the road. Hospital for the purpose of the proposed medical college is on one side and the college building is on the other side of the road. This, therefore, does not meet the requirement as per the statutory regulations.

The Committee further noted that the applicant Trust has now sought to explain that the land underneath the road belongs to the college authorities and they are the owners of the said piece of land. However, no documentary proof, in support of this claim has been submitted. Further, the so called clarification/certificate stated to have been given by the Tehsildar also does not satisfy that the applicant Trust meets the above mentioned statutory requirement. The certificate only states that the stated land holding for 31 acres of land falls in one Khatoni having different Khasra which are different to each other. Such grant of a so called certificate does not establish that the above mentioned statutory requirement of setting up the hospital, college building and other facilities in the single piece of 25 acres of land in the same campus is shown to be fulfilled. In any case, there cannot be a running road through the campus of the college. This does not meet the requirement of the Regulations.

Hence, the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided that the applicant has failed to fulfill the statutory criteria in this regard and the application of the applicant u/s. 10A be returned to the Central Government reiterating disapproval of the scheme.

39. Establishment of Midnapore Medical College & Hospital at Midnapore by Govt. of West Bengal.

40. Consideration of order dated 28.4.2004 passed in W.P.No.(C) No. 604/2002- Dr. Sanjeev Gupta & Ors. Vs. UOI & Anr – relation to modalities of screening Test.

Read: The report of the Sub-Committee with regard to modalities for conducting screening Test in pursuance of the directions of the Hon'ble Supreme Court dt. 28.4.2004.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council deliberated at length upon the representations received from the students and the draft minutes of the meeting held under the Chairmanship of Shri B.P. Sharma, Joint Secretary in the Ministry of Health & F.W. on 30th June, 2004 to finalise the nature, content and methodology of the screening test for the purpose of grant of registration in India to practice medicine to the Indian nationals with foreign primary medical qualification as per directions of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India dated 28/29.4.2004 in Writ Petition No. 604/2002 in the matter of Sanjeev Gupta & Ors. Vs. Union of India & Anr and decided to approve the draft minutes of the said meeting.

41. Minutes of the Finance Committee held on 29.6.2004 – Approval of.

Read: The Minutes of the Finance Committee meeting held on 29.6.2004.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council noted and approved the minutes of the Finance Committee held on 29.6.2004 with the information provided by the Secretary that action has already been taken before the meeting of Finance Committee to prevent the misuse of the facility of payment of overtime and conveyance allowances and strict following instructions have been given to the Section Heads:-

- (i) *Only those employees who are required for getting the work done due to contingent emergency should be called. Work of routine nature which has remained unfinished and is pending need not routinely be carried out on weekends.*
- (ii) *The requisition should be obtained from the concerned section head in writing and must be approved by the Secretary through Deputy Secretary (Administration).*
- (iii) *Orders should be issued only for those persons who have been specifically approved by the Secretary, to be called on weekends and holidays.*
- (iv) *All such employees will report of work and punch their entries in exact timings and overtime payment should only be made on the basis of the timings punched.*

42. Construction of Housing & Guest House Complex – Termination of the project & Retendering.

Read: The matter with regard to inviting tenders for construction of Housing & Guest House Complex.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council deliberated at length on the issue and decided to re-tender the work of construction of Housing & Guest House Complex and directed the office to take appropriate action therein.

43. Establishment of Kesar Sal Medical College & Research Institute, Bhadaj Ahmedabad by Adarsh Foundations Trust, Ahmedabad.

Read: The compliance verification inspection report (25th & 26th June, 2004) for establishment of Kesar Sal Medical College & Research Institute, Bhadaj, Ahmedabad by Adarash Foundation Trust, Ahmedabad.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (25th & 26th June, 2004) alongwith the previous inspection report (December, 2003 & March, 2004) and decided to recommend to the Central Government to issue Letter of permission for establishment of Kesar Sal Medical College & Research Instt. Ahmedabad by Adarash Foundations Trust, Ahmedabad with an annual intake of 100 students for the academic session 2004-05 u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

44. C.U.Shah Medical College, Surendranagar – Renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of students for the academic session 2004-05.

Read: The compliance verification inspection report (22nd & 23rd June, 2004) for renewal of permission for admission of 5th batch of students for the academic session 2004-05 at C.U.Shah Medical College, Surendranagar.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (22nd & 23rd June, 2004) alongwith the inspection report March, 2004 and noted the following deficiencies are still persisting:-

1. (a) The Shortage of teaching faculty is as under:

- (i) Professor-2 (Microbiology-1, Pharmacology-1)
- (ii) Assoc. Professors-2 (Obst.& Gynae.-1, Anatomy-1)
- (iii) Asstt. Professors-1 (Forensic Medicine-1)

(b) The following teachers have declared themselves to the part time and have not been considered

- (i) Surgery : 1 Associate Professor, 1 Assistant Professor.
- (ii) Ophtholomogy : 1 Assistant Professor.
- (iii) Anaesthesiology : 2 Professor, 2 Asstt. Professor.

(c) In view of above, the deficiency of teaching faculty is more then 12 %

(d) The Ratio of non-medical teachers exceeds the allowed limits in following departments:

- (i) Biochemistry-more than 50%
- (ii) Microbiology-more than 30%

2. Clinical material in terms of number of deliveries is inadequate and not commensurate with the patients attending the hospital as under:-

3. Although the institute has claimed bed occupancy at 86% on the actual verification, the overall bed occupancy is found to be around 65%. The records of patients' admission & discharge are not maintained properly. There is discrepancy in number of patients' lying on the beds in the wards & the names in the register. The clinical material is given in the table as submitted by the Dean does not correspond with the actual material on the day of inspection.
4. 800 MA machine is out of order. In one room there were two machines one for 300 and one for 100MA is placed. There is no automatic x-ray dryer machine. BARC certificate has been obtained where certain remarks about deficiencies are made.
5. Total nursing staff available is 217 as per the records. However, the duty arrangements rosters shows duty chart of about 110 nurses. The records are not properly maintained. Duty charts are made on loose papers.
6. The common room in the hostel does not have any seating arrangements as there are no chairs.
7. Most of the faculty has given address CU Shah campus without specifying the house numbers and block number. Few of them does not know their addresses when asked during verification. Teaching faculty shown their residence during verification in CU Campus is much higher than number of quarters available.
8. Nursing stations are shown by putting one table and one chair in the ward without any medicine, registers etc.
9. Admission register of casualty does not correspond to the patients admitted on the day of inspection. Patients lying in casualty were not shown in registers.
10. No surgery was conducted in ENT OT from 16th June till date of inspection.
11. Other deficiencies/remarks in the report.

In view of above the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Government not to renew the permission for admission of 5th batch of MBBS students at C.U.Shah Medical College, Surendranagar for the academic session 2004-05.

45. **Pondicherry Instt. of Medical Sciences, Pondicherry – Renewal of permission for admission of 3rd batch of students for the academic session 2004-05.**

47. Establishment of new medical college at Azamgarh by All India Children Care & Educational Development Society, Azamgarh.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the legal opinion received from the Council Advocate which reads as under:-

"I have been informed that the deficiencies which have been found in the documents submitted by the applicant, pertaining to the statutory precondition of ownership of 25 acres of single piece of land, were forwarded by the querist Council to the Central Govt. vide communication dated 31.5.2004.

In response to the communication of the querist dated 31.5.2004, the applicant had forwarded a communication dated 15.6.2004 and certain photocopies along therewith, through the Central Govt. communication dated 28.6.2004.

The perusal of the communication dated 15.6.2004 sent by the applicant society indicates that they are claiming that they had shown original documents of sale deeds of plot Nos. 687, 699, 700 13 Mi-191-A and that they are submitting photocopies of the sale deeds of plot No.13 Mi-191-A and also the photocopies of the lease deeds of plot Nos. 7, 8, 9, 686, 528, 679 and 786 claiming to be the leased by Sri Chandrabali Brahmachari.

It would be once again to relevant to notice that this applicant society had submitted a tabulated details of land under possession in December 2003 wherein documents at Sr. No.4 related to plot Nos. 686, 528, 679, 706, 7, 8 and 9 totaling to approximately to 22 acres of land. Subsequently, he had submitted another document purporting to be the English translation of this document at Sr. No.4 at a stamp duty of Rs.7540/-, which indicated that the land admeasured approximately 18 acres of land and not 22 acres. The discrepancy has been highlighted in my earlier opinion and also mentioned in the MCI communication dated 31.5.2004.

The founder/Manager of the applicant society had also submitted a communication dated 29.4.2004 wherein referring to the same lease deed, it has been mentioned that the area covered by the said lease deed is approximately 18 acres. The letter dated 15.6.2004 and the photocopy of the documents submitted now along therewith, once again indicated that the total area is approximately 22 acres.

It is again to be noticed that alongwith the letter dated 29.4.2004, the applicant society had submitted a photocopy of a complaint to the In-charge of the Police Station at Line Bazar, Jaunpur dated 29.9.1998 claiming that all the documents pertaining to the land had been lost by one Shri Parshu Ram Maurya on that day. Thus, it is the claim of this applicant society that they have lost the original of the land documents, in the year 1998 itself.

In view of the above, the claim now made in the letter dated 15.6.2004 that the applicant society had shown the original document of sale deeds pertaining to plot Nos. 687, 699 and 700 cannot be correct because the originals have already been lost by them in the year 1998 itself.

The applicant society has now sought to rely upon a document purporting to be a certificate dated 15.6.2004 issued by the Tehsildar of Tehsildar Sadar District Azamgarh to the effect of certifying that this applicant is having sale deeds to the extent of 6.45 acres of land and is also having a perpetual lease deed to the extent of 22.493 acres. Photocopies of the same documents which had been submitted earlier have been annexed with this letter and whereby the querist had sought my opinion for further course of action to be adopted by the querist with reference to the applicant society letter dated 15.6.2004.

The examination of the documents submitted along with the letter dated 15.6.2004, in my view, do not change the factual and legal position from what was existing when I had rendered my opinion on 5.5.2004. The submission of a document purporting to be a certificate by a Tehsildar is not a substitute for producing a original certified copy of either the sale deed or the perpetual lease deed under the provisions of Section 57 of the Registration Act, 1908. It appears that despite repeated requests on behalf of the querist, the applicant society is not willing to tender original certified copies of the registered sale deeds and the registered perpetual lease deed duly issued under Section 57 of the Registration Act, 1908 and when the applicant society is claiming that the originals were lost way back in the year 1998.

Keeping in mind the discrepancy in the description of the land in the document and that there appears to be some hesitation in producing the original certified copy of the sale deeds and the perpetual lease deeds for fulfilling the statutory precondition, under the provisions of 57 of the Registration Act, 1908, I am of the prima facie opinion that the statutory precondition of establishing that the applicant owns of 25 acres of single piece of land would not be taken to be fulfilled unless the applicant produces the original sale deeds and the perpetual lease deed, the photocopies whereof had been submitted alongwith the letter dated 15.6.2004.

Under these circumstances, I am of the opinion that if the applicant society continues to decline and fails to produce the original certified sale deeds and the original certified lease deed for the land claimed to be owned by the applicant society, it would not be permissible for the querist Council to accept these documents as fulfilling the above mentioned statutory precondition and it would be advisable for the querist Council to either give another opportunity to the applicant society specifically calling upon them to produce the original certified copies of the sales deed and the original certified copy of the lease deed and/or to recommend to the Central Govt. the disapproval of the claim submitted by this applicant on the ground of non-fulfillment of the statutory precondition for establishing that the applicant owns 25 acres of single piece of land as statutorily required by the Council."

In view of above and as per the letter from the Government of India dated 1st July, 2004 with regard to strict adherence to the time schedule for completion of admission to MBBS course for the academic session 2004-05 and for furnishing all the recommendations for grant of Letter of Permission for establishment of new colleges or annual renewals by 15th July, 2004, the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the disapproval of the scheme for establishment of medical college at Azamgarh by All India Children Care & Educational Development Society, Azamgarh received u/s.10A.

48. Mahatma Gandhi Instt. of Medical Sciences, Wardha – Increase of MBBS seats from 65 to 100.

Read: The matter with regard to increase of MBBS seats from 65 to 100 at Mahatma Gandhi Instt. of Medical Sciences, Wardha.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council noted that the Central Government vide letter dt. 28.6.2004 had forwarded a letter dt. 23.6.2004 from the Dean, Mahatma Gandhi Instt. of Medical Sciences, Wardha containing the compliance submitted by the college on removal of all the deficiencies pointed out in the MCI inspection report for consideration and sending the recommendation of the Council thereon to the Ministry for increase of seats at the college within the time schedule for which an inspection to verify the compliance submitted by the college was arranged to be carried out by the Council Inspectors on 2nd & 3rd July, 2004. The Committee further noted fax letter dt. 1.7.2004 received from the Dean, Mahatma Gandhi Instt. of Medical Sciences, Wardha stating that after the last inspection i.e. on 4th & 5th June, 2004 they have not submitted any compliance to the Council and therefore the question of verification does not arise. In fact they received the MCI report through the Ministry only on 21st June, 2004 and as recruitment of faculty has to follow a proper procedure, it was not possible for them to comply to the same in such a short time. Even today shortage of staff remains the same. The visit of the inspectors at the stage will be of no use and is not likely to yield any useful result.

In view of above the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee decided to return the application recommending disapproval of scheme pertaining to increase of seats from 65 to 100 at Mahatma Gandhi Instt. of Medical Sciences, Wardha received u/s 10A of the IMC Act, 1956.

49. Permission for recognition of Amrita Institute of Medical Sciences & Research Centre, Cochin for internship training.

Read: The matter with regard to carrying out the inspection of Amrita Instt. of Medical Sciences & Research Centre's Hospital, Cochin for its recognition for internship training.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to appoint inspectors for carrying out the inspection of Amrita Instt. of Medical Sciences & Research Centre's Hospital, Cochin for its recognition for internship training.

50. Probation period of Dr. A.S. Nayyar working as Deputy Secretary in the Council .

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council deliberated upon the issue and observed that certain files/cases handled by Dr. A.S. Nayyar would require adequate scrutiny / examination.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to authorize the President (Acting) to form a Sub-Committee to look into the aspect and in the meanwhile decided to extend the period of probation of Dr. A.S. Nayyar for one more year w.e.f. 25.04.2004.
